consumption of drugs. The scope and functions of Ministries of Health and social security programs for health care in different types of health systems are reviewed. The book recognizes the contributions of voluntary health agencies, as well as the characteristics of major services in the private sector of national economies. The serious implications of private profit in health systems and the benefits and difficulties of private/public sector relationships are also discussed.

Health System Performance Comparison: An Agenda For Policy, Information And Research

For many reasons, this decade is a time of rethinking many things. There is the impending turn of the millenium, an event packed with meaning.
