Pierre Bourdieu is one of the most protean intellectual forces in contemporary French thought. He holds the chair in sociology at the prestigious Collège de France, yet his influence extends far beyond the area of sociological research and theory. Bourdieu's work, presented in over twenty books, lies on the borders of philosophy, anthropology and ethnology, and cultural theory. The present volume consists of diverse individual texts, produced between 1980 and 1986, which take two forms: interviews in which Bourdieu confronts a series of probing and intelligent interviewers, and conference papers that clarify and extend specific areas of his current research. Now that Bourdieu's work has achieved wide diffusion and celebrity, this is an appropriate time for this volume, a pause for retrospection and resynthesis, for correction of misreadings and extension of previous insights, and for projection of the next stages of his work. For this English edition, Bourdieu's celebrated inaugural lecture at the Collège de France, *Leçon sur la Leçon*, has been added. Because of the verve and clarity of Bourdieu's arguments in this book, it is a very readable and concise introduction to his work.

The title of this book of poems, *In Other Words*, not only defines the content of the contemporary and internet generated poems of Leo Long, but it is also explanatory of poetry in general. The composition of a poem is the manifestation of feelings via thoughts via words onto paper, in other words, it is the conveyance of ordinary words into other, more poetic words, whilst the reader is confronted with the task to re-establish the origin of metaphoric references. The profundity of this title lies in the fact that Long mainly works on Allpoetry.com, an interactive online poetry website, and it therefore suggests various levels of perception, interpretation and the consequent formulation of meaning. The internet asks for "other words" - metaphoric references, evocative phrases, word-play and word pictures - all to evoke virtual feelings, often secretive: "Lips that hold me captive within my prisoned wish" (Lips) Poetry written and published on the internet is dynamic, immediate and powerful. And so is the work of Leo Long. Mainly focusing on patriotic, nature and love poems, he endeavors to be honest with a hue of humor - clear about the dilemma of the tension between reality and dream, within a spiritual and predestined awareness of fleetingness: "The shroud of night lays tattered Torn by slivers of a rising sun" (Birds) Yet once again hope surfaces in the following: "Floating free and high With multicolored streamers A pretend butterfly Held by tiny dreamers" (Purple Flutters By) and also in the picturesque: "Bright blue flowers blooming on the strands From seeds not sown with human hands" (Fence and Flower) Words on the internet and words published in a book share one connecting principle: the writer must touch the reader with these words - the eyes become the prism of the poem, fingers of feeling. But, as is the case with all
