The truths that Allen and Sophie discover over the course of that fateful year change both of their lives--and the lives of those who hear their stories long after they're gone--forever. In these seven essays, revised, rewritten, and expanded from his lectures, David Travis presents his thoughts on some of his favorite subjects: Weston, Stieglitz, Kertesz, Brassai, and Strand. ### Playing with the Edge

The advent of photography revolutionized perception, making visible what was once impossible to see with the human eye. Ultimately, Smith explores the capacity of photography to reveal what remains beyond the edge of sight.
